How we have spent/will be spending the funding:	The effect on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment:	How we will make these improvements sustainable (actions to continue into the next academic year 2019-2020):
<p>Increase confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport. Extra training for the 2 Newly Qualified Teachers at the school</p>	<p>Our 2 NQTs attended all 5 half-days training in PE in 2018-19 academic year, covering gymnastics, games, dance, OAA and Early Years. The PE lead was released to attend Manchester's relevant training for PE leads, including input on Active Maths. PE lead was available to provide support and resources to any member of staff.</p> <p>£750</p>	<p>The 2 NQTs are now fully trained in the delivery of PE lessons, which will impact on the quality of teaching and learning in PE the PE lessons they teach as they commence their RQT year. The PE lead will support teachers with their delivery of more active maths lessons to raise the activity levels of children across the curriculum. PE lead will continue to attend the PE lead training in 2019-20.</p>
<p>Purchasing new equipment for teaching and delivery of sport</p>	<p>Various equipment – tennis-balls, footballs etc - were bought to replace damaged and worn-out equipment. The new equipment ensured that the children at St Richard's had access to the resources required for the delivery of high quality lessons in all areas of PE. In particular, new dodgeballs were ordered, which has added to the variety of lessons covered in the games curriculum.</p> <p>£902</p>	<p>Replacing equipment is an ongoing cost every year, which needs to be allocated so all pupils are able to have their own undamaged equipment so lessons are safe and they have the opportunity to develop skills effectively - individually or in small groups.</p>
<p>Increased participation in after-school sport</p>	<p>The subsidising of Active Schools clubs allowed the school to offer a wide-ranging programme of after-school clubs to the children at an affordable cost. Over 100 children from key stage 2 took part in these after-school clubs this year in activities such as gymnastics, street dance and dodge-ball. In addition, there were free clubs run by staff, such as boys' and girls' football, netball, skipping, Change 4 Life . As a result, the participation rates of children in after-school sport have greatly increased.</p> <p>£900</p>	<p>The school will again be part of the Active School programme in 2019- 20. The after school clubs will also continue in 2019-20.</p>

<p>Increased participation in inter-school competition (Level 2)</p>	<p>£685 of this money was the cost of the school's membership of the Manchester Schools PE Association, who organise inter-school sport across the city and a £180 subscription to the Youth Sports Trust, which keeps schools up to date with the latest developments in PE.</p> <p>The school this year was able to compete against other schools in a wide range of sports including boys' and girls' football, cross-country, tag-rugby, cricket, hockey, handball, basketball and athletics. The school achieved the Gold Award in the School Games Mark for the first time as a recognition of the school's commitment to school sport.</p> <p>In addition, a TLR payment was made to the PE Lead for organising and leading school's participation in the inter-schools sports competitions.</p> <p>£4,530</p>	<p>The school will continue to take part in the Manchester Schools PE Association competitions in 2019-20. There will be a particular emphasis on Inspire events, where pupils of all abilities can take part, giving a wider range of children the opportunity to represent our school. The school will also look to compete against other schools in one off competition, such as football matches.</p> <p>The school will again apply for the Gold Award of the School Games Mark in the year 2019-2020.</p>
<p>Employment of specialist PE support staff</p>	<p>The money was used to pay 50% of the cost of a PE Teaching Assistant, who supported the teaching of games in the afternoons.</p> <p>The employment of specialist staff in PE resulted in the delivery of high-quality games lessons throughout the school as a result of the lower teacher to child ratio. This higher staffing ratio allowed the children to work in smaller groups and receive more individual attention and thereby gain more skills.</p> <p>The apprentice was also up-skilled by receiving on the job training and support from the PE lead.</p> <p>£3,028</p>	<p>The PE apprentice will return to a class based role in 2019-20 but will continue to support her class in all PE lessons.</p>
<p>Employment of a specialist PE coach for lunchtimes.</p>	<p>A specialist sports coach was employed to work with pupils every lunchtime on structured sports/play activities in Key Stage 2. 4 activities, such as football, hockey, basketball and structured play, were run each day – one for each year group; this resulted in more than 240 pupils taking part in extra-curricular sports each week. This represented a significant increase in numbers of pupils participating.</p> <p>In addition, the coach trained more than 70 KS2 pupils to act as sports leaders or referees, who support all pupils taking part in sports activities.</p>	<p>The employment of the specialist coaches will continue in the academic year 2019-2020 so that the increased activity levels resulting from the improved lunchtime provision will continue.</p> <p>The pupils trained as leaders and referees will again support other pupils at lunchtime and a new cohort of pupils will also be trained as leaders and referees.</p>

	<p>Extra equipment also had to be purchased for these new activities. The increase in these two figures was a key factor in the school gaining the Games Mark Gold level this year. Coaches were also employed to take enrichment lessons for Year 6 and Reception pupils as a boost to activity levels in these two age groups.</p> <p>£5,871</p>	
Funding for sports day	<p>All of the Key Stage 2 children were taken down to St Peter's (our local high school) in July 2019 for our annual school sports day. A great day was had by the children and the parents who came to watch. This highlight and showcase of the school sports year is a great motivational factor in the children's' enjoyment of sport. The money is used to pay for medals and certificates.</p> <p>£327</p>	The sports day will take place at St Peter's again next year.
OAA and enrichment activities	<p>There are some adventurous and exciting activities that are impossible to do at school. Some of the PE money was set aside to deliver BMX sessions at the National Cycling Centre. In addition, the school brought in the Dodgeball national coach to deliver a whole-day tournament for Year 6 children.</p> <p>£875</p>	These activities enable the school to build up community sports links, which children are encouraged to access in holidays and after school.
