Easter is not just a one day celebration but a whole season which lasts from Easter Sunday (last Sunday) until Pentecost Sunday (31st May 2020). Below is a prayerful meditation from Raymond Friel which recalls the events of the first Easter morning but which also helps us to look forward - to Pentecost and the birthday of the Church:



The rock split and a shaft of light shone into the darkness. Only the angels witnessed the resurrection, the power of the Spirit transforming Jesus into glory.

Mary Magdalen was the first to know, arriving early to find the empty tomb, called to a new life when she heard her name spoken by the risen Lord, whose very breath was peace.

He simply forgave and taught his friends the meaning of everything he had said and done and told them to wait until the Spirit powered them up to go out and tell the world.'

PRIMARY SCHOOL NATIONAL OFFER DAY

Despite the current situation, primary offer day was due to go ahead as planned today. Parents of children due to start in Reception at St Richard's in September 2020 will be asked by the local authority admissions team to contact school directly to accept a place but will be given the school admissions email address should they also wish to inform the local authority directly.

SCHOOL REMAINS CLOSED UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

As you are all very aware, St Richard's closed on Friday 20th March 2020. Every child who can be safely cared for at home should be. There is no requirement – even for parents who are key workers in critical sectors – to send their child(ren) to school if they do not need or want to. MANCHESTER CITY COUNCIL (MCC) WELFARE SCHEME

For families who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals and who are in need of additional financial support, please continue to visit:

For parents of pupils at St Richard's, this MCC scheme will continue until tomorrow, Friday 17th April. From Monday 20th April, we will have transferred to the national voucher scheme (see below). From this date, the MCC Scheme will not be available to parents and carers of children who are normally entitled to benefits-related free school meals. After Monday 20th April the MCC scheme will still be available but only to families who are not currently eligible for FSM but who are experiencing hardship as a result of COVID-19.

VOUCHERS FOR PARENTS OF PUPILS ELIGIBLE FOR BENEFITS-RELATED FREE SCHOOL MEALS

The Department for Education (DfE) has developed a national voucher scheme to support schools to provide parents of pupils eligible for benefits-related free school meals with supermarket vouchers in term time whilst school is closed to them.

From Monday 20th April, St Richard's will be able to provide eligible families with a weekly supermarket shopping voucher worth £15 per child, while schools are closed due to coronavirus. We will be providing vouchers electronically (which can then be redeemed online via a code). We can only do this if we have up to date and useable email addresses. If an email address is not available, parents will have to come to school to pick up a paper voucher.

There have been reports nationally of teething problems with this scheme. We ask eligible parents to be patient should this be the case next week with St Richard's but, rest assured, we will do all that we can to ensure that vouchers become available as soon as possible.
