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It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. Implementation - Curriculum delivery, Teaching (pedagogy) and Assessment

The funding **should** be spent by 31st July but the DfE has stated that there will be **no clawback** of any unspent money so this can be carried forward into 2024/25.
